"1000 Days to Go" Tokyo 2020 Countdown Events create excitement throughout Japan!

Next up, "500 Days to Go"! Saturday, Oct. 28th and Wednesday, Nov. 29th marked 1000 days to go until the opening ceremonies of the Tokyo 2020 Olympics and Paralympics respectively.

The Tokyo 2020 Organising Committee celebrated this fact by designating the month between the two dates as "1000 Days to Go" Month, and launched a variety of related events and campaigns throughout Japan during this time.

Various organisations in Fukushima have collaborated to promote the Tokyo 2020 baseball and softball games in Fukushima city, as well as the prefecture's recovery from the 3.11 earthquake. Discover some of their projects below!

Tokyo 2020 "1000 Days to Go"

Baseball Promotion Event

Fukushima and Yokohama, the two cities that will host baseball and softball at Tokyo 2020, collaborated to hold a baseball-themed event at Yokohama stadium on Saturday, November 25th.

Around 400 children took part in the event, including the Yokohama Elementary School All-Stars and the Fukushima Prefecture All-Stars, which is made up of 4th to 6th grade elementary school students from the Hamadori region of Fukushima prefecture. In addition to baseball workshops and games of catch, the two teams also took part in a friendly game against each other towards the end of the event. (Final score: 6-5 in Fukushima's favour.

Vice-governor of Fukushima Prefecture Masaaki Suzuki, mayor of Yokohama Makoto Kashiwazaki, and Tokyo 2020 Officer Operating Yukihiko Nunomura attended the event as guests, along with three former Olympians, Fukushima native and first ever manager of the Yokohama BayStars Kiyoshi Nakahata, specialty adviser to the same team Daisuke Miura, and Tokyo 2020 Sports Director Koji Murofushi, who engaged with the children through a talk show.

Both cities are planning to work closely together to hold another event in Fukushima prefecture at the "500 days to go" mark, and to further strengthen their relationship before Tokyo 2020.

Namie Hometown Festival 2017

A big thank you to all those who attended the 2017 Namie Hometown Festival, where a variety of Fukushima's traditional performing arts were exhibited over two days on November 25th and 26th at the regional sports centre in Namie. The evacuation order for Namie was partially lifted in March this year.

At the same time, the Tokaichi Festival was held in Namie for the first time in seven years, along with Drone Festa 2017, resulting in a combined turnout of around 30,000 people over the two days.

PICK UP!

It's a bit late to ask now but... What is a "Host Town"?

Point 1: Host Towns are opportunities to connect with other countries!

Host Town refers to local governments engaged in cultural exchange as a means of using Tokyo 2020 to revitalise local regions, e.g. by hosting training camps for athletes from other countries visiting Japan.

Local governments wishing to become a host town must decide on a partner country for cultural exchange, submit an application to the Japanese Government, and only then will they be registered as a Host Town. (A single Host Town may partner with several countries. Alternatively, multiple local governments may register as Host Town for a single country under one name). Many local governments have already registered as Host Towns and are developing projects for mutual cultural exchange.

The scope of this exchange is not limited to sports and tourism, and is also intended to

create innovation towards the revitalisation of Host Towns, through mutual cultural exchange, and by learning about the leading industries of their partner country

he Host Town project is not just for highlighting regional hospitality but is also an opportunity to create strong links that last beyond 2020 through the free expression of ideas.

Point 2: What are the benefits of being a Host Town?

Local governments in Japan registered as Host Towns receive a certain amount of funding towards projects with their partner country, to reduce the financial burden of cultural exchange.

At the prefectural level, training camp promotional activities carried out by local governments at embassies and at international conferences for various sports are not only supported, but also subsidized.

Point 3: The three types of Host Town!

1 Host Town (General)

This type of Host Town includes all local governments that fall under the description in Point 1.

2 Reconstruction Arigato Host Towns

A type of Host Town specifically for the prefectures of Fukushima, Iwate, and Miyagi who, since the 3.11 earthquake, have prioritised cultural exchange with countries that provided support after the disaster, e.g. by sending rescue and aid supplies, and who are in favour of maintaining cultural exchange (not limited to training camps) with

their partner countries beyond 2020.

3Inclusive Society Host Towns

A type of Host Town centered on the Paralympics, and designed to create communities based on universal design and to develop barrier-free mindsets by inviting athletes with disabilities from overseas.

Point 4: The Future of Local Areas Shaped by Host Towns

①Motomiya (Great Britain)

In February 2016, Prince William, Duke of Cambridge, visited Smile Kids Park, an indoor playground in the city of Motomiya that was set up as a safe place for children to play following the 3.11 earthquake.

In July this year, to commemorate the opening of the English Garden within the same park in Motomiya, a Sister Garden Memorandum of Friendship was signed with the Fukushima Memorial Garden in London.

In November, Motomiya City applied to become a Reconstruction Arigato Host Town with Great Britain as its partner country, as a way to use Fukushima's feelings of

gratitude and relationship with Great Britain (English Garden opening ceremony, Motomiya) to shape a new future. Cultural exchange between Motomiya and Great Britain is

expected to increase during the buildup to Tokyo 2020.



Koriyama registered as a Host Town (General) with the Netherlands on the basis that the Asaka Canal, a Japanese heritage site, was designed by a Dutch engineer. Koriyama's Coordinator for Intercultural Relations,

Joost Kralt, gives talks about the Netherlands at schools in the city, and organises events and football workshops to promote understanding of the Netherlands in Koriyama.

Baseball Kibitan

There are currently five Host Towns (General) in the prefecture including Fukushima (Switzerland), Aizuwakamatsu (Thailand), Koriyama (the Nether lands), Iwaki (Samoa), and Inawashiro (Ghana). There are four registered Reconstruction *Arigato* Host Towns including Minamisoma (Djibouti, Taiwan, USA, South Korea), Motomiya (Great Britain), Kitashiobara (Taiwan), Iitate (Laos). There are no Inclusive Society Host Towns in Fukushima yet

Tokyo 2020 Mascot Decision Draws Near! Elementary student voting registration open until February 22nd

The long journey to decide upon a Tokyo 2020 mascot is finally reaching a climax. The mascot selection committee has narrowed the selection down from a total of 2,042 mascot designs to three final candidates, which were announced on Thursday, December 7th. The responsibility of selecting the final

mascots now falls to Japan's elementary school children.

Voting registration with the Tokyo 2020 Organising Committee opened on Monday, November 20th. Registration and voting will be carried out on a per-school basis. Schools must be registered beforehand, otherwise they will not be eligible to vote.

The voting period will extend from Monday December 11th until Thursday, February 22nd of next year. Once the votes have been tallied, the results will be announced to the public on Wednesday, February 28th.
